Our fees have not been raised in over 10 years. For a decade, we have been teaching children to read for less money than it cost us to teach, because we have always strived to educate your children for the lowest cost to the parents as possible. We have also had very generous benefactors that have subsidized the tuition fees so we could charge lower fees; but with rent, books and supplies costing more each semester our board felt it was time to raise the tuition

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Accommodations for Fall

This summer I took a course written by Dr. Mel Levine called School Attuned... All Kinds of Minds. This was course that helped teachers understand that students different strengths and weaknesses. In the course Dr. Levine suggested some accommodations that I thought you might could use. The following accommodations might be useful for you to share with your child's teacher and possibly implement for the 2007-08 school year. Hope you have a great year!

Accommodation Modes

Accommodations are strategies used to bypass a weak Neurodevelopmental construct/function or academic skill. In contrast, interventions are intended to strengthen a weak

Neurodevelopmental construct/function or academic skill. Accommodations can adjust the presentation of material and information to the students (i.e. input) or the production demands on the students (i.e. output).

Accommodations, like interventions, should be utilized in ways that avoid embarrassment or stigmatization of the students. Try to ensure that all students in the class understand the purpose of accommodations, and know that accommodations are available to any student who needs them. Make it clear that teasing or disrespecting students who are receiving an accommodation is unacceptable classroom behavior.

- RATE MODIFICATIONS: decreasing time demands of students, especially those who process information slowly or have slow output rates Examples: Stopping frequently to review and summarize material ...Allowing additional time on tests
- **VOLUME MODIFICATIONS:** decreasing the workload on students **Examples:** decreasing the amount of reading, perhaps by providing abstracts or summaries...Allowing shorter written assignments... Assigning fewer math problems for homework
- **COMPLEXITY ADJUSTMENTS**: simplifying the difficulty level of tasks **Examples**: Assigning essay questions that require discussing only one concept at a time...Giving assignments that do not mix types of problems Presenting math word problems that include no extraneous information
- **PRIORITIZING**: allowing students to focus efforts on certain aspects of a task, while staying clear of aspects that are more challenging to the students **Examples**: Giving a free pass on writing mechanics so students can focus on content or ideas...Solving fraction problems without simplifying answers
- CURRICULUM CHANGES: altering lessons, activities, or programs to bypass weaknesses Examples: Letting students print instead of using cursive writing ... Enrolling students in an extra are class rather than requiring a foreign language
- **SPECIAL DEVICES**: using technology and instruments to bypass weaknesses **Examples**: Calculator...Spell check tool...Word processor etc.
- ALTERATION OF ROUTINES: adjusting procedures of rules to accommodate students' needs Examples: Changing class schedules ... Permitting breaks...Allowing doodling or use of objects (e.g. bean bad) to redirect energy
- FORMAT SHIFTS: replacing an assignment format (e.g. text) that is problematic for students with another format (e.g. visual presentation) Examples: a diorama instead of a speech...An oral report instead of a written report
- **TASK SHARING**: using collaboration with a peer or adult to support students **Examples**: Assigning or allowing collaborative writing with a peer who is strong in writing...Working directly with students for the first few steps of a task...Scheduling consultations with students for extra support
- FEEDBACK MODIFICATIONS: changing grading policies and feed back modes Examples: Alternatives to tests, such as portfolio assessment...Recognition Memory items for tests, such as multiple choice or true/false instead of recall items...Separate grades for mechanics and content

I hope you can use these accommodations. Please excuse the somewhat technical jargon, but I was quoting and had to use

Dr. Levine's language. If you like this type of article, then I will try to put one in the news letter every issue.

Dear Parents and Tutors:

We are again planning a 12 week fall program. It will be conducted on Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The program will run from Saturday, September 22 to Saturday, December 15, 2007 at St. Benedict at Auburndale High School (SBA), 8250 Varnavas Dr., Cordova, TN 38016.

Workshops, which are <u>mandatory</u> for all personnel, will be held Saturday September 15, 2007, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at St. Benedict at Auburndale School **BRING A LUNCH!!!!**

The Dyslexia Foundation's own language curriculum is used for instruction. Students MUST take part in the full curriculum for the entire 12 week period.

The following policies must be understood by all who apply to the program - - as tutors or students:

- 1. Only those who have been tested and recommended will be accepted as students. Please contact a Director if you have questions about being accepted.
- 2. Unexcused absences by anyone (students and/or personnel) can result in dismissal from the program and all future Foundation programs. Illness is the only acceptable reason for absence. Any other excuse must be cleared before the absence by the board.
- 3. All tutors must exceed sixteen years of age.
- 4. All participants must be current members of The Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis. Dues are \$15.00.
- 5. A certain dress code will be observed by everyone.
- 6. ALL WORKSHOPS ARE MANDATORY FOR ALL PERSONNEL.
- 7. All personnel must fulfill all obligations as set forth in the application contract.

Please apply for the subject you prefer to tutor, math or social values. New parent-tutors apply only for reading. The following areas require tutors:

- 1. Reading (All tutors tutor Language)
- 2. Math or Social Values

Workshops and daily staff meetings will provide instruction in the use of the materials. Supervision will be given over all areas of instruction.

The tuition will be \$180.00 per student **plus a \$25.00 registration fee.** The entire amount is due with the application before September 6, 2007. It cannot be refunded. Remember parents who are going to tutor must apply. The above figures require an enrollment of 60 students in order for the Foundation to offer the Fall Program at this tuition cost.

All applications must be returned <u>before September 6, 2007.</u> If you are unable to meet this deadline please call and notify the Director of your intentions. Neither students nor tutor applications will be accepted after that date unless verbal approval has been made. An exception will be made for new families who were tested during the Summer 2007 semester.
