Could It Be A Trick or Magic? Maybe...

There are two ways of putting and keeping information in long-term memory. One is to do it over and over, something like... memorizing the multiplication tables. Of course the question is - how many times does that take a individual? The other way is to connect the new information to something already up there (in the brain). You must connect it in a meaningful way, so when the new information is desired to be recalled, the old will bring the new to mind. That is the trick.

Here is the magic. When students study by reading their notes silently, CAT scans and MRI's show particular areas of the brain are active and thus light up on the scans. When the mouth, throat, and ears are also engaged

Dear Parents and Tutors:

We are again planning a 12 week spring program. It will be conducted on Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The program will run from **Saturday, January 24 to Saturday, April 25, 2009** at St. Benedict at Auburndale High School (SBA), 8250 Varnavas Dr., Cordova, TN 38016.

Workshop, which are mandatory for all personnel, will be held Saturday **January 17, 2009**, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at St. Benedict at Auburndale School **BRING A LUNCH!!!!**

The Dyslexia Foundation's own language curriculum is used for instruction. Students **MUST** take part in the full curriculum for the entire 12 week period.

The following policies must be understood by all who apply to the program - - as tutors or students:

1. Only those who have been tested and recommended will be accepted as students. Please contact a Director if you have questions about being accepted.
2. Unexcused absences by anyone (students and/or personnel) can result in dismissal from the program and all future Foundation programs. Illness is the only acceptable reason for absence. Any other excuse must be cleared before the absence by the board.
3. All tutors must exceed sixteen years of age.
4. All participants must be current members of The Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis. Dues are \$20.00.
5. A certain dress code will be observed by everyone.
6. ALL WORKSHOPS ARE MANDATORY FOR ALL PERSONNEL.
7. All personnel must fulfill all obligations as set forth in the application contract.

Please apply for the subject you prefer to tutor, math or social values. New parent-tutors apply only for reading. The following areas require tutors:

1. Reading (All tutors tutor Language)
2. Math or Social Values

Workshops and daily staff meetings will provide instruction in the use of the materials. Supervision will be given over all areas of instruction.

The tuition is \$180.00 with a \$25.00 registration fee for a total of \$205.00 per student. The entire amount is due by the student's first Saturday unless other prior arrangements are made with the program directors. Fees cannot be refunded. Remember parents who are going to tutor must apply. The above figures require an enrollment of 40 students in order for the Foundation to offer the Fall Program at this tuition cost.

All applications must be returned before January 17, 2009. If you are unable to meet this deadline please call and notify the Director of your intentions. Neither students nor tutor applications will be accepted after that date unless verbal approval has been made. An exception will be made for new families who were tested during the Fall 2008 semester.
