students were only 6 or 7 when they first started attending; and I have personally seen the despair in their faces when I meet them for the first time. The parents' faces are not much better; because fighting with regular schools is an exhausting battle and unfortunately most parents don't know the ground rules. Then they come to us and WOW!, what a difference! The children are smiling and happy because they are learning to read. For some of these children some phycologist or teacher has told them they will never learn to read. Can you even imagine what it is like to be told at 5, 6 or 7 that you are a failure and you will never learn to read? Then to come to a program like ours and boom, you are reading! It is great; it is wonderful. It restores your faith in life to watch these children bloom like a butterfly. I love to use the analogy of the butterfly and I have used is many times but I will use is again for our first time readers or those of you who may not remember.

The butterfly starts life as an egg and then as a humble caterpillar. It then spins itself into a cocoon (chrysalis to be correct) and by all outward appearances looks quite dead. When suddenly by the grace of God it breaks out of the shell (chrysalis) and spreads its wings and is the beautiful butterfly that we all admire. Our children do the very same thing. They are sad, humble children just trying to exist in a very hostile school environment and eventually withdraw into a shell so they won't feel the mean things that teachers, other students and sometimes well-meaning parents (who don't understand their problem), say to them. So their self-esteem drops to rock bottom; when suddenly by God's help they find the Dyslexia foundation and POW! They break out of their shell and start exercising their wings trying to 'fly' and turn into bright, beautiful, selfconfident students. It is delightful to watch and those of you who have tutored can agree is a joy to observe. We save children and their parents lives; by giving the support they need to both student and family. Your support and faith keeps us going. Your trust that we can help is what gives us the opportunity to help your child cope with their dyslexia. Please keep supporting and believing in us and in your child. God bless you all. I hope to see you and your child on January 28.

My teachers call me a behavior problem because I cannot sit still for very long and I am distractible in class.

My classmates think that I am dumb because I cannot read or write or do math problems.

I am a misfit in society, for succeeding depends on academic skill and these are the areas in which I cannot achieve.

I am lonely because I often shy away from those who soon know about my school failure and call me "retard."

I choose younger children to play with so that I do not have to compete with them.

My self-esteem is very low...I am afraid to try new tasks after a while because I have failed so much in the past.

I often withdraw into my little shell or act out my hostility trying to tell everyone how unhappy I am. But not many people understand that that's why I act the way that I do.

My future is dismal...If I do not get help, I am a likely candidate for dropping out of school before I am sixteen.

I am a potential juvenile delinquent because I must be accepted by someone; and if the someone is the wrong crowd, then I will choose to join those who will accept me.

I am destined to a trade school even though my I.Q. may exceed 140 because to get into college you must be able to read and write.

I must spend my lifetime in a job that I dislike and a future that is limited because no one reached me soon enough.

I am the boy next door who stays to himself.

I am the girl in Sunday School class who cried when you asked her to write a verse from the Bible.

I am the Boy Scout who dropped out of the troop when he had to read from the Boy Scout Manual.

Dear Parents and Tutors:

We are again planning a 12 week fall program. It will be conducted on Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The program will run from Saturday, January 28 to Saturday, April 29, 2017 at All Saints Episcopal Church, 1508 S White Station Rd., Memphis, TN 38117

Workshops, which are mandatory for all personnel, will be held Saturday January 21, 2017, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at All Saints Church BRING A LUNCH!!!

The Dyslexia Foundation's own language curriculum is used for instruction. Students MUST take part in the full curriculum for the entire 12 week period.

The following policies must be understood by all who apply to the program - - as tutors or students:

- 1. Only those who have been recommended will be accepted as students. Please contact a Director if you have guestions about being accepted.
- 2. All tutors must be sixteen years of age or older.
- 3. All participants must be current members of The Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis. Dues are \$20.00.
- 4. A certain dress code will be observed by everyone.
- 5. ALL WORKSHOPS ARE MANDATORY FOR ALL PERSONNEL.
- 6. All personnel must fulfill all obligations as set forth in the application contract.

Please apply for the subject you prefer to tutor, math or language. New parent-tutors apply only for reading. The following areas require tutors:

- 1. Reading (All tutors tutor Language)
- 2. Math

Workshops and daily staff meetings will provide instruction in the use of the materials. Supervision will be given over all areas of instruction.

The tuition is \$200.00 per student plus a \$75.00 registration fee. The entire amount is due with the application before January 21, 2017. It cannot be refunded. Remember parents must tutor must fill out an application. The above figures require an enrollment of 60 students in order for the Foundation to offer the Fall Program at this tuition cost.

All applications must be returned before January 21, 2017. If you are unable to meet this deadline please call and notify the Director of your intentions. Neither students nor tutor applications will be accepted after that date unless verbal approval has been made. An exception will be made for new families who were tested during the fall 2016 semester.
