What Is Summer School and What Can I Expect?

If you haven't been to a summer semester, you don't know what you and your child are missing. Summer School is a Super Semester! A day of summer school equals a week of regular school. This is because we do either one on one teaching or such small groups teaching that way your child gets truly individualized instruction. What happens each day? There are 10 subjects taught daily. Each subject is 50 minutes long. They are all taught in small groups, usually two to four students, or one on one. The areas covered are as follows:

Math - small group- taught twice each day. We mainly work on concepts and logic.

a very important skill that is used during spelling tests.

Lunch - Yes, the students need to eat but we also use this time to socialize and learn some people skills that, some of our children so desperately need.

P.E. - this is fun but also important because the students need to learn the rules for playing certain sports and playing in "good sportsman" way.

Rainbow - small group - different activity each day M-F. Every Monday they will do the same activity during the Rainbow period. Then the same activity on Tuesday and so on. These are fun but like everything else, we use these to *teach* as well.

Creative writing - This gives the students an outlet for their creative side. Ms. Carolyn Vickers teaches this activity and she does a super job of getting the students to express their inner imagination. This is a great activity and Ms Vickers is wonderful.

Public Speaking - Why does my child need public speaking? Well, we feel like we use this skill when we give an oral book report or interview for a job or even talk to the teacher or our friends. The main skill here is to learn to organize ones thoughts so our speech patterns make sense to whom ever we are speaking to. Whether that be a group or an individual. We try to coordinate this activity with the power point project the student's create in their computer class, They love it but should a student not want to stand up and give their speech we never

Computer - This is the students favorite class. They love learning how to create a power point. They add pictures and sound. It really is great!

Art - Art is where the students really get their creative juices flowing and their art is fabulous and gives them an outlet for all the pent up emotion. We have several projects that the student can select or create their own. Please make a big deal over they bring home! It matters to the students how you react. Be proud not critical.

Games - Games sounds like something we just threw in to take up time...Wrong!! Board games and card games teach children logic and perhaps more importantly how to be a good sport. How to win well as well as lose well. Both of these (winning and losing) are a part of life and must be taught. Sometimes these are the one thing that gets our children into the most trouble. Games also teach not only fair play but how to follow rules and take risks. All these things are important. If you really analyze our summer program or the Saturday program I think you will find that there is nothing that we do that is not well thought out and benefits your children. Perhaps that is why so many of us have stayed around for so long. We stay because we take pride in what we do at the Foundation. PRAYING FOR PERSPECTIVE - By George Valadie

They seem to pass much too quickly these days. But they're already gone again ... another year and another class. Another graduation and another celebration.

Afterward, amid the joyful chaos, I ran into the parents of a former graduate from some ten years ago who had travelled cross country to honor their niece who was now taking her turn crossing the stage of success.

The dad asked me, "Can you believe all these years have gone by so quickly?" I nodded in agreement, "You're so right, but I won't lie, there have been a few days along the way that have dragged a bit."

And isn't that true for moms and dads, too.

Our commencement brought back memories of having met some of these same students when they were incoming transfers, interviewing with me in hopes of admission.

I always ask each applicant the same question. It sounds like this: "At every graduation, we finish with a procession out of the church. The teachers go first, followed by the students.

Our teachers will then see some student pass by and they'll sigh, 'Boy, we're sure gonna miss that kid!'

But then another will follow and you'll hear someone mutter, 'Oh, thank God, they're gone!'

But tell me, before we accept you here at our school, which will they say about you?"

Friday night we graduated 225 students. Overall, they're just a great group of kids.

I'll never say I'm 'happy' to see any of them go. But still, as with every class, there are always a few kids who amaze me that they have made it. And for one or two, God has no greater miracle to his credit.

There were no scholarships for these, no colleges came calling. If you're of the opinion that all people 'have a thing,' well, school just wasn't theirs.

There's always a reason they find it so darn tough to get this far. When it comes to academics, some just don't, others just can't. Some had to climb over impediments made of self-inflicted stupidity. Others had to battle their own cross-wired brain and sadly - and wrongly - believed themselves to be stupid.

But I'm more amazed about the few who fought every rule we had. Dress code or cell phones - they loved walking on the tightrope suspended over the door to a permanent exit.

They strode down the halls smelling of attitude and arrogance - the smirky, snippy, I-wish-paddles-were-still-in-fashion kind.

There are all sorts of people who think we should toss such ding-dongs. Why put up with such unnecessary nonsense? I get that. And we have on occasion allowed some to have a second chance ... somewhere else.

But I also think the mission of a Catholic school is to embrace the needy as well. And Lord knows these are the ones who need us. In an odd way for sure, but they certainly do need us.

I've long told people that if you give us, if you give any Catholic school, four years with a kid, we'll win. We'll help them get it together. We'll help them get ready to go where they might not have even known they wanted to go.

Not all of them of course ... no one wins every game. Neither do we, but I like our record.

I've talked to their parents. They worked a lot harder than we did. And when I get to shake their hands after the ceremony, you can see more than just joy ... there's also that hard-to-hide hint of relief that leaks out from the smile, the voice, the tears.

Nancy says the first real instruction a mom gets with her child is when the doctor says, "Push! Push!"

And 18 years later, here they are, still 'pushing' that same child - through the school, out of the nest, and into the world. Neither event comes all that easy.

There's a beauty to working in schools. No student has ever been exactly like another. Sorta like snowflakes - without the peacefulness. Sorta like the kids in a family.

But in reality, what we do with those young people might not be our finest work. We celebrate great hope. They're not all the same. But they can all make it through.

It's amazing the miracles God can accomplish ... especially if we push.

Dear God - Please be with them all - they can be a mess and they sure can make one. Please guard them from themselves. Amen.

Dear Parents and Tutors:

We are again planning a 4 week summer program. It will be conducted week days from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The program will run Monday June 20, 2011 to Friday, July 15, 2011 at St. Benedict at Auburndale High School (SBA), 8250 Varnavas Dr., Cordova, TN 38016.

Workshops, which are mandatory for all personnel, will be held on June 16 & 17, 2011, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at St. Benedict at Auburndale School BRING A LUNCH!!!!

The Dyslexia Foundation's own language curriculum is used for instruction. Students MUST take part in the full curriculum for the entire 4 week period.

The following policies must be understood by all who apply to the program - - as tutors or students:

1. Only those who have been tested and recommended will be accepted as students. Please contact a Director if you have questions about being accepted. **Exceptions can be made.**
2. Unexcused absences by anyone (students and/or personnel) can result in dismissal from the program and all future Foundation programs. Illness is the only acceptable reason for absence. Any other excuse must be cleared before the absence by the board.
3. All tutors must exceed sixteen years of age.
4. All participants must be current members of The Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis. Dues are \$20.00.
5. A certain dress code will be observed by everyone.
6. **ALL WORKSHOPS ARE MANDATORY FOR ALL PERSONNEL.**
7. All personnel must fulfill all obligations as set forth in the application contract.

Please apply for the subject you prefer to tutor, math or social values. New parent-tutors apply only for reading. The following areas require tutors:

1. Reading
2. Math

Workshops and daily staff meetings will provide instruction in the use of the materials. Supervision will be given over all areas of instruction.

The tuition will be \$550.00 per student plus a \$25.00 Registration fee per student. The entire amount is due with the application before June 14, 2011. It cannot be refunded. Remember parents who are going to tutor must apply. The above figures require an enrollment of 60 students in order for the Foundation to offer the Summer Program at this tuition cost.

All applications must be returned before June 14, 2011. If you are unable to meet this deadline please call and notify the Director of your intentions. Neither students nor tutor applications will be accepted after that date unless verbal approval has been made. An exception will be made for new families who were tested during the Spring 2011 semester.
