The gift

Jean Thompson stood in front of her fifth-grade class on the very first day of school in the fall and told the children a lie. Like most teachers, she looked at her pupils and said that she loved them all the same, that she would treat them all alike. And that was impossible because there in front of her, slumped in his seat on the third row, was a little boy named Teddy Stoddard.

Mrs. Thompson had watched Teddy the year before and noticed he didn't play well with the other children, that his clothes were unkempt and that he constantly needed a bath. And Teddy was unpleasant. It got to the point during the first few months that she would actually take delight in marking his papers with a broad red pen, making bold X's and then marking the F at the top of the paper biggest of all.

Because Teddy was a sullen little boy, no one else seemed to enjoy him, either. At the school where Mrs. Thompson taught, she was required to review each child's records and she put Teddy's off until last. When she opened his file, she was in for a surprise. His first-grade teacher wrote, "Teddy is a bright, inquisitive child with a ready laugh. He does his work neatly and has good manners...he is a joy to be around."

His second-grade teacher wrote, "Teddy is an excellent student well-liked by his classmates, but he is troubled because his mother has a terminal illness and life at home must be a struggle."

His third-grade teacher wrote, "Teddy continues to work hard but his mother's death has been hard on him. He tries to do his best but his father doesn't show much interest and his home life will soon affect him if some steps aren't taken."

Teddy's fourth-grade teacher wrote, "Teddy is withdrawn and doesn't show much interest in school. He doesn't have many friends and sometimes sleeps in class. He is tardy and could become a problem." By now Mrs. Thompson realized the problem but Christmas was coming fast.

It was all she could do, with the school play and all, until the day before the holidays began and she was suddenly forced to focus on Teddy Stoddard.

Her children brought her presents, all in beautiful ribbon and bright paper, except for Teddy's, which was clumsily wrapped in the heavy, brown paper of a scissored grocery bag. Mrs. Thompson took pains to open it in the middle of the other presents. Some of the children started to laugh when she found a rhinestone bracelet with some of the stones missing, and a bottle that was one-quarter full of cologne. She stifled the children's laughter when she exclaimed how pretty the bracelet was, putting it on, and dabbing some of the perfume behind the other wrist.

Teddy Stoddard stayed behind just long enough to say, "Mrs. Thompson, today you smelled just like my mom used to." After the children left she cried for at least an hour.

On that very day, she quit teaching reading, and writing, and speaking. Instead, she began to teach children. Jean Thompson paid particular attention to one they all called "Teddy." As she worked with him, his mind seemed to come alive. The more she encouraged him, the faster he responded. On days there would be an important test, Mrs. Thompson would remember that cologne.

By the end of the year he had become one of the smartest children in the class and... well, he had also become the "pet" of the teacher who had once vowed to love all of her children exactly the same.

A year later she found a note under her door, from Teddy, telling her that of all the teachers he'd had in elementary school, she was his favorite.

Six years went by before she got another note from Teddy. He then wrote that he had finished high school, third in his class, and she was still his favorite teacher of all time.

Four years after that, she got another letter, saying that while things had been tough at times, he'd stayed in school, had stuck with it, and would graduate from college with the highest of honors. He assured Mrs. Thompson she was still his favorite teacher.

Then four more years passed and yet another letter came. This time he explained that after he got his bachelor's degree, he decided to go a little further. The letter explained that she was still his favorite teacher but that now his name was a little longer.

The letter was signed, Theodore F. Stoddard, MD.

The story doesn't end there. You see there was yet another letter that Spring. Teddy said he'd met this girl and was to be married. He explained that his father had died a couple of years ago and he was wondering...well, if Mrs. Thompson might agree to sit in the pew usually reserved for the mother of the groom. Thompson smelled just like... well, just like the way Teddy remembered his mother smelling on their last Christmas together.

To all my fellow Dads -

Just wanted to send out a note to say thank you for all you do for your children. I bought a power screw-driver the other day and it came with a manual - in three languages. Then I bought a set of shelves. It's got a set of directions as well. But both my children came into this world with guidelines, no operator's nothing – no instructions, not a single tip, hint or suggestion. Not even a warning sticker that they were dyslexic...NOTHING. It was as if God thought "Nah, there's no need, surely a dummy can raise one of these." I have long appreciated His confidence, but ...my wife seemed to have a knack for this parenting thing right from the getgo. I'm not saying it was easy for her, in fact there were times (lots of them I'm afraid) when I probably made it harder. But, the learning curve for me was pretty darn steep. Now that both of the children are grown, I'm finally feeling a little more confident. Sometimes wishing I could have another shot at it, not wishing real hard mind you, and sometimes thankful just to have survived. Maybe I can do better with the grandkids. Maybe there were no directions because there's never been just one right way. Some of us spend hours coaching them through sports, fostering their love of touchdowns or RBIs or a favorite team – or is it our favorite team. Some prefer the camping and hiking path, teaching them tents and campfires and how to find your way out of the woods. Some help master Calculus and Physics, an effort that started long ago when we saw the joy on their face as they realized they could "add and take-away." Still others trail along from recital to recital, lugging outfits, and hair things and makeup stuff that apparently carry some life-and-death significance we'll never understand. And, some spend every waking hour at a job (or several) because that's what their family needs most. And though we may not be limited to one "right way", I can attest there are quite a few wrong ones. The variations on that theme I could list would take a very long time and a lot of paper for me to list. Let's just say I didn't perfect fatherhood – and leave it at that.

Best wishes to all of you. Loving our children in some miraculous way we might never have thought was possible – I guess God thought that was a good start. Not enough certainly; but, without it, what else would matter. Thank you for all you do.

Dear Parents and Tutors:

We are again planning a 12 week spring program. It will be conducted on Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The program will run from Saturday, January 21 to Saturday, April 22, 2023 at Lord of Life Lutheran Church, 6865 Poplar Pike, Memphis, TN 38119

Workshops, which are mandatory for all personnel, will be held Saturday January 14, 2023, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at Lord of Life Lutheran Church. BRING A LUNCH!!!

The Dyslexia Foundation's own language curriculum is used for instruction. Students MUST take part in the full curriculum for the entire 12 week period.

The following policies must be understood by all who apply to the program - - as tutors or students:

- 1. Only those who have been recommended will be accepted as students. Please contact a Director if you have questions about being accepted.
- 2. All tutors must be sixteen years of age or older.

3. All participants must be current members of The Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis. Dues are \$20.00.

- 4. A certain dress code will be observed by everyone.
- 5. ALL WORKSHOPS ARE MANDATORY FOR ALL PERSONNEL.
- 6. All personnel must fulfill all obligations as set forth in the application contract.

Please apply for the subject you prefer to tutor, math or language. New parent-tutors apply only for reading. The following areas require tutors:

- 1. Reading (All tutors tutor Language)
- 2. Math

Workshops and daily staff meetings will provide instruction in the use of the materials. Supervision will be given over all areas of instruction.

The tuition is \$300.00 per student plus a \$75.00 registration fee and \$20.00 for dues. The entire amount is due with the application before January 14, 2023. It cannot be refunded. Remember parents must tutor must fill out an application. The above figures require an enrollment of 40 students in order for the Foundation to offer the Spring Program at this tuition cost.

All applications must be returned before January 14, 2023. If you are unable to meet this deadline please call and notify the Director of your intentions. Neither students nor tutor applications will be accepted after that date unless verbal approval has been made. An exception will be made for new families who were tested during the fall 2022 semester.
